Integrated urban development policy is a process in which the spatial, sectoral and temporal aspects of key areas of urban policy are co-ordinated.*"



In historic urban landscapes, one major challenge for integrated urban development is finding the right balance between the preservation of cultural heritage assets and the necessary economic development.

Thereby, seeing our cultural heritage assets not as a barrier but as an "opportunity" and as a key element for integrated urban planning will help us to develop new strategies, methodologies, concepts and policies within the course of our project "HerO - Heritage as Opportunity".

To exchange on the relevant aspects of integrated cultural heritage management will be a major task of our Thematic Network during the next three years.

The great interest in our network shows that our selected topic is vitally important to a large number of historic towns. Altogether, more than 50 cities from all over Europe applied to become partner to our network.

Taking into account a balanced geographical coverage, we have selected your cities as being the most promising in terms of a vital exchange on integrated urban development strategies.

We look forward to mutual learning and benefit, enriching discussions and a fruitful and successful co-operation with you during the next three years.

Now I wish you a productive workshop and an enjoyable first get-together.

Tomorrow morning you will do a guided walking tour of the historic town, so I hope you will receive an impression of our city and its cultural heritage values during your stay.

Regensburg is a unique example of a central-European medieval trading town and it bears exceptional testimony to the cultural traditions especially in the Holy Roman Empire. The well-preserved ensemble of the "Old Town of Regensburg with Stadtamhof" has therefore been inscribed on the UNESCO World Heritage List in 2006.
