



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Main objectives of HerO

- > Development of integrated and innovative management strategies and urban policies
 - facilitating the right balance between
 - the preservation of built cultural heritage
 - and the sustainable, future-proof socio-economic development of historic urban landscapes
 - managing conflicting usage interests
 - capitalising the potential of cultural heritage assets for economic, social and cultural activities (→ Heritage as Opportunity)
- > strengthening the attractiveness and competitiveness of the old town areas and historic city centres
- upgrading the urban environment by integrating cultural and natural heritage in sustainable urban development policies

Partnership composition

- more than 50 applications from cities all over Europe asking for inclusion in the network received
- > careful selection process under consideration of the requirements 50/50% competitiveness/convergence, broad geographical coverage and commitment of the partners
- final decision: netw ork of 10 European cities (together with their associated Managing Authorities)
 - all cities are faced with the challenge of the protection of their built cultural heritage within the frame of the requirements of our changing society and economy
 - broad spectrum of different strategies on how to handle these problems
 - as w ide as possible replication potential out of the network for a broad range of other cities all over Europe is expected
 - partner cities with a strong experience can support less advanced partners in the design and elaboration of their programmes/policies

Opportunities and benefits from the Fast Track Label

- European netw orking to result in concrete local impacts two-way-bridge between thematic networking activities and the mainstream programmes of the Structural Funds (Operational Programmes)
- development of collaborative dynamics between the cities and the Managing Authorities of the regional Operational Programmes
- transferring know ledge up from the local to the regional level
- defining and creating links between the local action plans to be produced and the Operational Programmes
- jointly develop projects that could receive Operational Programme funding
- contributing to regional policies (structural funding period 2014 2020)
- benefitting from active support of the European Commission (dialogue of network representatives with EC experts)
- enhanced communication efforts and Europe-wide recognition





Starting situation and main challenges partner cities face

"The historic urban landscape acquires its exceptional and universal significance from a gradual evolutionary, as well as planned territorial development over a relevant period of time through process of urbanization, incorporating environmental and topographic conditions and expressing economic and socio-cultural values pertaining to societies."

Quote from the Vienna Memorandum on "World Heritage and Contemporary Architecture - Managing the Historic Urban Landscape" (UNESCO World Heritage Centre, 2005)

- **⇒** The historic urban landscape cannot be merely seen as an accumulation of significant monuments,
- it rather needs to be considered as a living organism and vital living space for its inhabitants.







Management of historic urban areas – a big challenge

- economic pressure
- decay of cultural heritage because of lack of investments or even pressure of investments
- reduced commercial activities due to lack of extension possibilities for expanding businesses
- tight restrictions on architectural changes
- inappropriate new dev elopment
- lack of recreational and green areas
- out-dated infrastructure

Main expected outputs

- Innovative methodologies, management strategies and urban development policies for an integrated approach which aims to balance heritage protection and urban development
- Local action plans to support the sustainable protection and rehabilitation of historic urban landscapes associated with socio-economic urban development of old town areas to strengthen their attractiveness and competitiveness
- Establishment of Local Support Groups for an enriching exchange and discussion among the relevant key stakeholders in order to achieve sustainable solutions which meet the needs of all parties concerned (particular emphasis will be placed on the multi-level exchange with the responsible Managing Authority Institutions)
- Capacity building by the partners through the **Europe-wide exchange of experience** on good-practice solutions concerning the sustainable management of historic urban landscapes
- Adoption of proven management strategies of World Heritage cities to serve as effective tools for the su stainable management of non-World Heritage cities alike (exchange and mutual benefit between European heritage cities of different size and structure, some of them inscribed on the UNESCO World Heritage List, others not)
